#### VICE-PRESIDENT'S RAMBLINGS JAMES GULD


Build more models, build more models, build more models...

it is just started, half built, or completed, we want to see what all of you are working on these days. In fact, bring your travel kit too and maybe even trim a few more pieces. We have plenty of table space available for those that want to build during the meeting.

As for December's "Model of the Year" contest, I have looked through this year's contests and have com-

piled a list of every "Best of Show" model that is eligible (see chart above). All of the modelers listed will need to have their model at December's meeting in order for the model to be judged. We can't compare it to all of the others if the model is not there.

We will also be announcing the official results of the "Modeler of the Year" at December's meeting. I look

forward to seeing all of you there with all of the wonderful models that you have, are, and will be building.

### JIM'S SPRUES & REVIEWS JAMES GULD

Where to start... I've picked up a bunch of new stuff this past month.

For Axis armor, I added to the stash the Dragon Tiger P premium edition kit and the Elephant kit. Both now include more pe then the previous regular release along with aluminum gun barrels, magic tracks, and, in the case of the Tiger P, a corrected turret. In the Elephant kit they also give you the option of the later style rear entry access door.

In the Allied camp, I picked up Dragon's new M4A2 Tarawa kit and the M2/M2A1 halftrack. The halftrack is one of their new "Smart Kits" which means it doesn't have as much photoetch as some of their other new kits, but uses the slide mold technology as much as possible. After looking through the box and hearing about the kit on Missing-Lynx, I came across only a couple minor items. The front wheels have a noticeable weighted bulge to them. The real tires don't do that even aired down (though it might be useful to use as a flat tire). The only other minor issues are that the tiedown loops are molded on and the spring clips that hold the side hood doors down are a little flat looking. It probably would have been better to have them as separate pieces. The only other detail is the rear spring for the bogie units. The very early M2s didn't use these springs and some of the M2s used in Tunisia didn't have these springs or had a field-modified single spring. The later M2s had the double coil spring like the kit. So look carefully at your references if you're building a particular vehicle, or don't mind me and just build it (see VP's Report). The .30 & .50 Cals are beautifully done, probably the best out there now until the new Tasca .50 Cal comes out. This looks like a really sweet kit and I'm looking forward to the M3 kit and whatever else they come up with on the halftrack chassis.

The M4A2 Tarawa kit is also very nice. They have an all-new 75mm gun low bustle turret and M4A2 hull with the welded hoods. It also comes with very detailed hatches with separate spring details and on the photoetch sheet they provide foundry-casting symbols. Very cool indeed. I plan on trying to make a mold of these so I can add them to my other Shermans (a lot easier then trying to do it out of stretched styrene). The only minor flaw was the tracks—they put them on a card in the kit, and it caused some of the end connectors to be bent over. Dragon says that they will replace tracks for people at no cost. I have already taken mine

off the card and let them lay flat in the box, and will hit them with the hair dryer to get them to behave. The tracks are made of DS vinyl; it is some sort of mix of styrene and vinyl, but it glues together with regular liquid cement and the detail on them is excellent. I've been bitten by the Sherman bug and plan on sponsoring a special contest next year for Best Sherman Tank (any scale, era, or country that used them). So with the entire new Dragon kits out there start planning on building one.

## BOOK REVIEW DON SMITH

#### **Monte Cassino**


The Hardest-Fought Battle of World War II by Matthew Parker Anchor Books, 2005

This month's book is about the battle of Monte Cassino on the Gustav Line in Italy during the winter and spring of 1943 – 44. The battle was pretty brutal and Matthew Parker does a pretty good job describing

the account from the view point of the soldiers on the front line. In typical English fashion, Mr. Parker describes the heroic efforts of the Allied divisions and down-playing the American contribution. Needless to say it's hard to fault him when the American general was the great Mark Clark.

The book covers the four battles that were fought to take the medieval monastery of Monte Cassino and the town below it. The battles were pretty bloody and the results were gruesome, Parker spares no details about the rotting bodies, so be warned. The battles include the slaughter of the US 36th "Texan" Infantry Division at the Rapido River to the final taking of the monastery by the Polish Carpathian Division some months later. The diversity of troops from all over the world is pretty interesting. The monastery was not used by the German troops until the Allies bombed it into ruins and made an ideal fortress. The German 1st Paratroop Division then occupied it and the town of Casino and took a bloody toll on the Allies.

The soft-cover book has some nice maps and photos and retails for \$15.00; I picked up a copy at Borders. If you were wanting to do some figure models and dio-



ramas of this era and theatre then this is your book, although you'll have to use your imagination because there are not many photos. There were relatively few armored vehicles used due to the inhospitable terrain. I bought the Osprey book covering the same battle and wish I had it while reading this book due to Osprey's typical fine map details, artwork, and

photos. The personal accounts used in Parker's book were very interesting and well done. I'll give it a rating of 4 out of 5 stars.  $\star\star\star\star$
