

Unser Racing Museum


This has absolutely no relationship to armored vehicles, so I couldn't call it Armor Files, could I? For this issue, I took a quick trip to the Unser Racing Museum, located here in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

The Year 2021 was not a good year by any standard, but it was especially difficult for the Unser family. First, Bobby Unser passed away on May 2, at the age of 87. Then, his son Bobby jr. died on June 13 at 65. Finally, on December 9, Al Unser died at 82 after a long battle with cancer. My condolences to their families, they will be missed. These events convinced me that I should make a return visit to the Unser Racing Museum.



I went on December 31, the very last day of the year. I did call ahead, just to make sure they were open. The Museum opened in 2005 and was owned and operated by Al and Susan Unser and their family. It consists of two main buildings: the main museum and an annex. The main building interior is shaped like a wheel, with spokes dividing it into five sections. These sections consist of exhibits devoted to the careers of the Unser family in different areas of racing, along with some moving/temporary displays. Most of the emphasis is on the trio of Bobby, little brother Al, and his son Al jr. Between them, the Unsers have nine





Indy 500 wins: Al jr. with two, Bobby with three, and Al, tied with three others, at four, the most individual wins in the race. Additionally, Al is the only driver with a sibling and son who have also won. Al also holds

the record for being the oldest Indy 500 winner, the previous record holder—Bobby. On top of all that, Al has the record for most laps led at Indy. All three also won the International Race of Champions (IROC) series. The Indy car section has several championship cars, along with the in-

famous STP "Novi" race car, which only Bobby Unser was able to handle safely. Besides Indy Cars, there is a section devoted to the Unser family and the Pike's Peak Hill Climb. The Unser family dominated the race series for so many years that it became unofficially known as "Unser's Mountain." Another section is devoted to other race classes, including sprint cars and the IROC. One section has an exhibit of early, wood track motorcycle



racing, a sport that saw many riders as well as spectators killed.

At the center hub of main building is a raised, rotating platform. On it is a yellow Penske Indy car representing the car Al drove in the 1987 Indy 500. This race ended with the most unlikely and improbable race win ever. I won't go into the details here, that could fill up the entire newsletter, but you can look up the details yourself, there are plenty of articles on the web. A little teaser: it involves a washed up/over-the-hill driver and a car that was literally taken from a museum exhibit display in Pennsylvania.

Behind the main building is the annex. This space houses more race cars, Indy Pace Cars, and other cars from Al's collection. It also has artworks, race uniforms, helmets, trophies, and lots of other memorabilia. As in the main building, some of the cars and other displays in this building have changed over the





years. An interesting note: many of the cars on display have a teddy bear or other stuffed animal sitting in them. Postponed: ASM Model Display at the Folds of Honor Patriots Gala

The New Mexico Folds of Honor Gala charity event and ASM's Model Display scheduled for February 12 has been postponed until September 2022 due to covid concerns.

Further details will be provided as we learn more about the new event date, and whether it will still be held at the Embassy Suites in Albuquerque.

The theme of the ASM Display is models from all the US Services from the Korean War to the Present. This includes aircraft, helicopters, armor, vehicles, figures, ships, subs, dioramas—any scale. We have been lacking in modern armor, ships/subs, and dioramas in our previous displays, so please think about building something in those areas that could be used in our display.

The Folds of Honor Foundation provides scholarships for the children and spouses of America's fallen and disabled Service members. The Gala is one of their primary fund-raising events, where donated articles are auctioned off in a silent online auction and old-fashioned verbal auction during the dinner. ASM has provided built models for their auctions.
