the upcoming ACE (Albuquerque Comic Expo) event at the Albuguerque Convention Center, June 27 – 29 (http://abqcomicexpo.com). We should have a similar space in a similar area to last year (basically in the fover/lobby/that big flat bit by the door). Anyone who has models of comic-related, Sci-Fi, or real space subjects should contact Mike Blohm to make arrangements to deliver/ drop them off and if anyone would like to volunteer to help out then please contact Mike also and he will put you on the list. It is an event well worth attending if Sci-Fi and/or comics tickle your fancy at all. If you like to see personal appearances by people that you might recognize from

the TV, scantily clad young ladies (note: the convention center has a strict no drooling policy, so don't do it) people in imaginative costumes waving unfeasibly large plastic axes, or even if you just enjoy watching overdressed nerdy-looking people in enormous outfits almost getting strangled when their cloaks get caught in the escalators, there's something for everyone. There are good vendor areas, the people are friendly, the food is theoretically edible and there are some remarkable sights to behold. Remarkable in every sense of the word... VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT MIKE BLOHM

ASM at ACE 2014

ASM has received notification from the leadership of Albuquerque Comic Expo (ACE) 2014 that they would like to have ASM participate in the convention again as we have done the past two years, and we are planning to do so. ACE 2014 will be held at the Albuquerque Convention Center in downtown Albuquerque on June 27 - 29. The last two model shows were a real blast—see links to those below—and we'd like to put on another great show.



The purpose of ASM's display is to promote the modeling hobby, possibly gain some new members, and to have fun. We have a prime location right in the middle of the main traffic area where attendees come in to the building and also transit back and forth from the large vendor area to where the guest speaker presentations and seminars are held. In 2012 and 2013 we had hundreds if not thousands of folks stop by to look at the models and to ask questions about the models or painting techniques. Pictures of ASM display's location inside the convention center are included below.

The convention times when ASM will participate (Sat and Sun only) are 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. on Sat June 28 (we need to set up around 9:00 A.M.), and 11:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M. on Sun, June 29. We will need ASM members to man our tables during those times, probably split up into two or three shifts

per day with three to four people per shift. A signup roster will be provided at the June ASM meeting, and emails will be sent out requesting help. Please let Mike Blohm (blohmm@aol.com) or Joe Walters (jwalters22@comcast.net) know if you can participate and what days and times (morning or afternoon) are best for you. Folks manning the ASM tables do get free admission on those days, and there is plenty of fun to be had.

As in past years, the theme of the model display will be "Science Fiction, Real Space, Fantasy, and Science"—the same as what ASM has for its January Special Contest each year. In 2013 we had over 100 total models on five tables. The models were grouped by themes and genre that included Star Trek and Star Wars (about a third of the display); Real Space and Man In Space; science fiction television shows (Buck Rogers, Battlestar Galactica, Space 1999, The Jetsons); science fiction movies (2001, War of the Worlds, Alien, When Worlds Collide); Gundam and comic book figures; and science fiction vehicles (Batman, Speed Racer, Mad Max). Please consider showing your models at the show even if you are not attend-

ing. There is no limit on how many models you want to bring.

CONTEST DIRECTOR UPDATE JOHN TATE

"Japan" was the points contest for the May 2 meeting, with eligible entries having a Japanese theme. In Juniors, Aleya Montano picked up a First, Second, and Third for her Gundam entries, with a Best of Show and People's Choice awarded to her Bandai ¼-scale Warrior. In Intermediate, Gorham Smoker picked up a First and People's Choice award for his Revell ¼5 H-13 helicopter and a First for his Italeri ⅓5 Commando Car. Partap Davis won a First for his Platz ⅓5 "Girls und Panzer" figure collection, and Adrian Montaño a First for his Revell ⅓2 Colonial Viper. Don Smith won a First and Best of Show for his Maisto ⅓8 Lexus car model.

In Masters, James Strickland won a First for his Hasegawa 1/350 IJN Yukikaze, Tony Humphries a First for his Tamiya 1/48 IJN Bulldozer and 1/35 IJA tanker figure, and Brian Peck a First, Best of Show and People's Choice for his Tamiya 1/32 F4U-1 Corsair. Although not a Japanese subject per se, I ruled Brian's Corsair model eligible for the "Japan" theme as it fought the Japanese throughout the Pacific War and also had a few Japanese aircraft to its credit, as reflected by the Rising Sun kill markings under the cockpit. Likewise, I ruled Glenn Bingham's nicely-done 1/32 Mustang model eligible for theme, as it was in markings representing an aircraft that flew fighter missions over Japan during the final year of the War.

ASM members continue to turn out an impressive variety of scale models, at all skill levels; the more you build, the better your modeling gets, so this excellent showing bodes well for the future of our club and our hobby.

At the June 13 ASM meeting, there will be a WWI Special Contest, and a D-Day Contest sponsored by the E-Board. Let's put in a good effort and bring some nice models to honor these two anniversary themes, which will also assist Mike Blohm and Josh Pals in putting together related ASM theme displays at the State Fair in September

Remember, there is only a month left before ASM's big "Chile Con 3" IPMS Region X Contest on July 10-11, so now is the time to finish up your builds and organize your entries. If you think









Bonus Pages! Prairie Wind 2014 Region 6 Convention Jack Garriss

Air Capital IPMS Modelers hosted the Region 6 convention at the Marriott Hotel and Convention Center on May 16-17 in Wichita, Kansas. Hobbytown USA in Wichita co-sponsored the event.

Mark Vittorini and crew offered a Friday Evening "Bring & Build" Social Buffet, a McConnell AFB / Kansas Aviation Museum Tour, and a Saturday evening Awards Banquet. They advertised over 100 Vendor tables and a kit raffle.

They really tried. Arriving on Friday, I stopped at the Registration desk to check in. There was one person for all the tasks including individual kit registration. It did go smoothly once I proved that I had indeed pre-registered. He gave me a ticket for the raffle and told me, when I asked, that the banquet tickets weren't ready yet. I figured the ticket was for the raffle but it turned out that it was the banquet ticket. The raffle room had a great many kits. Tickets were \$2.00 each, or twelve for \$10.00.

The contest room was huge, an entire ballroom divided into contest room and vendor room with room to spare. When I came in most of the model tables were still empty and pretty much stayed that way. The convention team had hoped for about 150 or more attendees but only had about 100. The number of models fell short of expectations too. Many categories were empty and many more had only one or two entries. I didn't take pictures at that time assuming that the tables would fill up as the day progressed. When I returned that evening most of the tables were still pretty empty. Saturday morning didn't fare any better. By the time Saturday evening came I decided that I would take pictures after the judging. When I went in I found that many of the modelers had already cleared their models

and had gone home. I was never able to get an accurate count but I didn't see anywhere near a hundred models on the tables. My best guess/estimate would be about 75-80 models total.

I don't think the Air Capital IPMS Modelers made money or broke even. The Marriott is an expensive venue that required 25 rooms a night to give any break on costs. There was room for lots of vendors but I only saw eight. Most of them were like our swap meet. The Friday night "Bring & Build" Social Buffet saw another hitch. It was supposed to be a sliders / finger foods / drinks event. It turns out that the Marriott didn't do that, so we had a mini-banquet three-course meal. Only about fifteen people signed up for that. The Raffle room had kits left over that were auctioned during the Saturday evening banquet.

During the awards presentation the cycle of pictures sometimes didn't match the presentation list and one entire page of awards, including all the Best Of's and special awards, went missing.

Overall, I enjoyed the convention and the people there. Mark and his fellow club members tried hard to make sure everyone felt that they enjoyed it. I did well but I wish there had been more models. I won three firsts, uncontested, and two thirds with several others in the categories. I was given the "Man into Space" special award, because, again, no one else entered. There were some seriously excellent models on the tables. But, between the costs they incurred for the venue as well as the lack of attendance, they couldn't have done well, even with Hobbytown's assistance.

ASM SUPPORT TO CAVALCADE OF WINGS MODEL DISPLAY MIKE BLOHM

ASM members Mark Vaughn and Mike Blohm set up and manned the Cavalcade of Wings' model display at the Durand Open Spaces celebration on May 10, 2014. The event was called "Soaring the South Valley: A Celebration of Birds and Planes," and was a rededication of the 1999 sale of land that was formerly the home of Westernair of Albuquerque to preserve it as "open space." Dick Durand Jr. formed Westernair Flying Service in 1955, and in 1959 it became Westernair of Albuquerque. The business included a 1,850-foot-long grass airstrip called the "Pea Patch" as part of its operations. Now known as Westernair Inc., it has been in business for over fifty years and is run by his son Dickie Durand III. The business rebuilt aircraft and restored classic airplanes, and in the process brought flight to the South Valley of Albuquerque. The business eventually expanded to the West Mesa Airport, and power lines installed in the early 1980s made the airstrip no longer functional for landings. After the airstrip was closed the property (ten acres) became agricultural land. The airstrip's location and some of the hangar buildings/shops are still visible in the Open Space area.

The event included a display of gliders by the Albuquerque Soaring Association, a Civil Air Patrol (CAP) color guard for the opening ceremony, lots of model glider flying, the Cavalcade of Wings' (CoW) model display, a host of displays by nature-related organizations including some live predator birds (peregrine falcon, owl and kestrel), guided bird-sighting walks, and a fly-by near the end of the event.

The CoW model display consisted of two tables with about 28 models that had been borrowed from CoW displays at the Kirtland AFB control tower or from storage. There were several models of aircraft that had been based at the



Durand air field, including a Cessna that turned out to have the very serial number and CAP markings that had been painted on it by Westernair. See the picture with the hangar behind it where the real aircraft had probably been painted. Lots of people came by to ask about the models and the CoW display at the airport. Handouts on both the CoW and ASM were passed out to the visitors. Hopefully we will get some of those folks to come visit an ASM meeting. The Durand Open Space is located at 4750 Isleta Blvd SW.


















Bonus Pages! StarFest 2014 • Denver, Colorado Joe Walters

The annual StarFest science fiction convention took place this past May 2-4 at the Marriott Denver Tech Center in Denver, Colorado, and my wife Linda and I attended. This is always an excellent show, with so many activities and events that we usually start by looking at the schedule and marking off the things we can't attend due to timing conflicts. In the last few years, the show has expanded into several simultaneous conventions, spread out to two additional and adjacent hotels. There's ComicFest, RoboFest, GameFest, HorrorFest, and many more.

They always bring in numerous guests from various science fiction and fantasy movies, and this year featured Amanda Tapping (StarGate SG-1, Sanctuary), Nichelle Nichols (Star Trek), Sam Witwer (Supernatural, Smallville), Susie Plakson (Star Trek: The Next Generation), Tim Russ (Star Trek: Voyager), Billy Dee Williams (Star Wars), Giancarlo Esposito (Breaking Bad), and several more.

In addition to the on-stage guests, there are many other activities including autograph sessions for all the guests, videos of television episodes and movies, an amazing costume competition that gets more impressive every year, gaming competitions, makeup demos (Susie Plakson, while onstage, was made up as her Klingon character Key'lehr by one of the Star Trek Next Gen makeup artists, and spent some time in character, which added



There were three items of interest specifically to modelers: Modelers University, Make & Take, and the Model Show.

Modelers University was simply an informal setup for the purpose of teaching people the basics of modeling. Classes included Getting Started, Construction Techniques, Weathering and Detailing, and more.

Tom Grossman ran the Make & Takes, which were popular on an ongoing basis.



Below: Two areas in use for Make & Takes. These areas were busy for the entire show.































Does this count as modeling-related? In addition to StarFest, I also attended the annual conference of the International Trumpet Guild (I work for them) in Philadelphia in May, and, though they're technically not *models*, they are plastic!

At the opening concert, the trumpet ensemble Tromba Mundi (with well-known jazz trumpeter Vince DiMartino) came onstage carrying the Tiger Trumpets (lower right), and played a piece that demonstrated that they actually do play like "real" trumpets, and at the end of the piece, one of the players even sounded a very high, very loud "power" note, establishing that these things can take it.
