FIELD TRIP REPORT MIKE BLOHM

Pima Air & Space Museum

This Field Trip Report covers a trip that I recently made to the Pima Air & Space Museum in Tucson, Arizona. The museum has a huge outside exhibit area—over half of the museum grounds with approximately 157 aircraft and 18 aircraftrelated ground vehicles from all the US services, and from some other countries as well. The "Spirit of Freedom" Hangar next to the entrance has a B-18B Bolo, PBM-5A Mariner, F 107 Ultra-Sabre, SR-71A, A-10A, S-3B Viking, and an AH-1S Cobra, amongst others. Just outside is a Ground Launched Cruise Missile display that includes a BGM-109, a missile transporter-erector, erector launcher, and tractor. Perfect for anybody contemplating a diorama.



The museum has a total of seven MiG fighters including a MiG-29 and MiG-21PF. The "bomber row" includes an F-111D, B-57E, EB-47E, B-50, NB-52A (Edwards-NASA test launch platform), B-52D, B-52G, B-58A, and WB-66. Unfortunately the B-36 and WB-57 were in a refurbishment area. Bombers elsewhere included a B26K, B-23 Dragon, and Bristol Mk IV Blenheim. There are plenty of cargo, aerial refueling, and anti-submarine aircraft. Of note were the Boeing YC-14 prototype, PV-2 Harpoon, NASA B-377SG (ex-C-97) Super Guppy, AP-2H Neptune in the multi-grey SEA scheme, and a YQM-98A "Compass Cope" drone.



Several independent hangar buildings contain approximately 73 aircraft. The 390th Bomb Group Memorial hangar has a very nice B-17G. You can peer into several of the hatches, bomb bay, and ball turret to get an appreciation of what it was like to fly in it. Hangar 3 houses a B 24J, B-25J, A-26C, C-47 in D-Day markings, PT-19 and



AT-11 trainers, Fi-103 (V-1) Buzz Bomb, and Hurricane Mk II, amongst many others. Hangar 4 houses a B-29, C-46D, TBM-3, P 63E, F4U-4, and a Ki-43 Oscar. Of note is a FM-2 Wildcat that was recovered from Lake Michigan where it was lost during carrier landing training in April 1945. Surprisingly the museum did not have a P-47, P-51, F6F, or F8F anywhere in its collection. Make sure you visit the WW II Barracks, as it includes some model displays. The Space Gallery hangar includes an X-15A-2 mock-up and some nice models of various spacecraft.



The museum has just about all the post-WW II USAF and USN/USMC fighters and attack aircraft in several long rows. Standouts were an F-4C that had scored a MiG-17 kill in Viet Nam, an F-84F Thunderstreak in Thunderbirds markings, and an F 11F Tiger in Blue Angels markings. Foreign types include a Hawker F-58 Hunter and a Fairey AEW-3 Gannet, a most ungainly-looking aircraft. There are also groupings of Presidential and civil aircraft and 12 helicopters.



Very highly recommended—plan on at least a whole day to see everything. The best thing about the museum is that you are able to get up close to almost all the aircraft to check them out and to get



photographs from just about any angle you want. For more information, check out the museum's web site (http://www.pimaair.org).

JIM'S ARMOR CORNER JAMES GULD


I have decided to change my column slightly. Instead of just regurgitating what you can find for yourself on PMMS, I will try and focus on an armor-related subject of some sort. I hope you enjoy it.

This month I thought I would discuss researching, as I'm in the middle of a new diorama involving an M16B "Wasp" halftrack set near a canal lock near the town of Sarreinsming, France, in December 1944. Personally, I get into doing the research for a diorama almost as much as building and finishing it. I have found that the Missing-Lynx site (http://www.missing-lynx.com) is a great place to start for getting info on a particular subject.

The people that contribute to the site are some of the top armor modelers in the world. For my current diorama, I had asked a question about the setting and received some answers from some members, and also started Emailing with one member who was able to help me find a site on canal locks. This guy is a lock nerd. The web is great for this sort of stuff. People are into the

weirdest stuff...

Through this site I was able to find a modern-day picture of the lock I'm working on and of old abandoned locks that were built at about the same time as the lock I'm working on. I also started corresponding with this person and he acted as my second set of eyes. Working from an old black and white photo is tough and it helps to have a second opinion as to what something is in a photo or how it might be constructed. With his help, we've been able to figure out many of the items in the photo with some degree of certainty. Some items are still a mystery as to what their function is, and you just have to go with your best WAG. I will bring in this diorama as a Work-in-Progress and it will also be apart of an article I'm writing for "Boresight," the AMPS magazine.
