BONUS PAGES! ASM Model Display at the 2019 Air Force Ball Mike Blohm

The ASM model display at the 2019 Air Force Ball went very well. The event, held on Saturday, September 21, at Kirtland AFB, celebrated the 72nd birthday of the USAF as well as the 75th anniversary of the D-Day invasion on June 6, 1944. ASM had planned to have three tables in three different rooms on which to display models, but we ended up with just two. One was in the main room where the festivities took place. It was decorated in a USO theme with lots of camouflage netting and we set up 31 D-Day related models there. The other table was located in the entryway into the club where the attendees checked



in. We ended up closely-packing 45 models on that table, covering the Korean War, Viet Nam, Air Defense Command, and Operations Desert Storm, Enduring Freedom, and Inherent Resolve. We brought 23 tubs of models but due to the space limitations not all were put out on the tables. We did have a total of 76 models on the two tables.









Lots of people stopped by and asked questions about the models and we were thanked for putting on the display. Ken Piniak wore a World War II tanker uniform complete with pistol and submachine gun, so he got lots of questions. Thanks to the following ASM members for setting up and manning the tables during the event: Josh Pals, Frank Randall, Ken Piniak, and Matt and Mike Blohm. Thanks also to John Tate for dropping by with his models and helping with the set up. 




















BONUS PAGES! ASM BUILDS MODEL FOR FOLDS OF HONOR EVENT MIKE BLOHM

The Albuquerque Scale Modelers club provided a $\frac{1}{48}$ -scale A-10A Thunderbolt II "Warthog" model for the auction at the Folds of Honor New Mexico's "Red, White, and Blue Celebration Dinner" fund-raising event held on September 23, 2019, at the Tanoan Country Club in Albuquerque. The Folds of Honor Foundation provides scholarships and other assistance to the spouses and children of soldiers killed or disabled in service to our country. The model was built by



Mike Blohm. The Monogram model kit was donated by Brian Peck. The Folds of Honor was very appreciative of our donation and thanked us for again contributing models for their auction. ASM had two F-16 models for their 2018 event.

The model was built as an A-10A of the 78th Fighter Squadron "Flying Tigers" of the 23rd Fighter Group while assigned to the 332nd Air Expeditionary Group at Jacobabad, Pakistan, in March 2002.

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The scheme was from the Print Scale 48-073 A-10 Thunderbolt II decal sheet. The kit came with decals for a warthog-faced A-10 of the 47th Tactical Fighter Squadron of the 917th Tactical Fighter Group, Air Force Reserve in a Europe 1 paint scheme (two greens and one gray). However, I wanted to build a three grays scheme with the colorful shark mouth used by the 23rd Fighter Group Flying Tigers, as that would be more appealing to any potential bidders on the model.

The kit was built out of the box other than the decals. It is an older kit with raised panel lines, and a lot of fit problems that required sanding. The 1/48-scale kit is pretty huge. I usually build 1/2-scale aircraft, and the A-10 was bigger than a B-17 model in ½. It probably had more parts. too. To avoid it being a tail-sitter, I loaded the front of the fuselage below the cockpit with modeling clay holding a lot of fish sinkers--as much as I thought the narrow nose gear would hold. To my dismay, the model sat back on its tail after I had everything put together. The kit does come with a clear plastic "support stand" that I had not wanted to use, but did use in the end. It is way back by the tail and



is pretty unnoticeable. I used a whole lot of Master Model Light Ghost Gray (FS36375) and Dark Ghost Gray (FS36320) to paint it. What I really would have liked was a decal or a template for the fake canopy on the underside of the nose that is in Gunship Gray (FS36118). I ended up drawing the outline of that in pencil and then painting it on. I was surprised at how well that came out. Building the ordnance took a





long time. I built six CBU-71 canisters (that is the closest thing the pieces match to), four AGM-65 Mavericks and two LAU-88 triple rail launchers, and an ALQ-119 ECM pod. Getting all those attached to the pylons was a major pain.

The base for the model is a large 18×20 picture frame. I inserted a thick grey-colored mat under the glass that looked like an aircraft parking ramp, and had a 3×4 inch metal plate built with the appropriate wording about the model. That plate and a smaller plate stating "Model by Albuquerque Scale Modelers" were then attached by double-sided tape onto the glass.



The A-10 model sold for \$150 in the auction. The winner donated it to the nine-year-old son of one of the scholarship recipients at the dinner. The boy is a special needs child who is "all about airplanes." So the model is going to a good home. The 2020 Folds of Honor event will be held at a larger venue, and they do want ASM to put on a large model display for that event. So start building for that!









BONUS PAGES! INSPIRATION STRUCK! BRIAN PECK

Building models can be a on-again/off-again roller coaster ride. I have been building models almost continuously since I was eight years old, when my brother introduced me to the hobby. I was a Baa Baa Black Sheep kid and fell in love with the cool blue airplane on the TV. He built a Corsair and gave it to me, which I promptly crashed and destroyed after seeing one crash on the program. After cooling off he showed me how to build models and I discovered how much work one puts into making a nice model. That moment started the journey into a life long hobby and the love of flying machines.

As many of you know I was on a massive burnout spell from about early 2015 until spring of this year. Burnout can occur at any time and without warning. Most of the time it is a result of cramming for a contest, show, or just sometimes life just hands you a brick wall and then, "Bam!" You are done. I have seen burnout handled many different ways; some folks pack up the bench and put it away until the mojo returns. Others try to power through it and sometimes—rarely—some folks just give it up altogether. I have been on burnout spells before, but the latest one was the most severe. Usually going to shows or visiting air museums got the juices flowing but this time none of those worked. Not even the IPMS Nats in Phoenix last year helped to fire up the juices.

It was like starting a lawnmower, and it would fire up for a brief moment and then sputter out over and over again. I had a few sporadic builds but nothing of lasting motivation.

I went through all the above listed phases at one time or another since 2015, and the walking away part was for me was the hardest to face. I thought about selling my entire collection at one point within the last year.

Everything. Paint, tools, kits, decals etc. Everything.

I figured I could get nice chunk of change for all my stuff, but fortunately the monumental task of selling it all off deterred me from actually following through. I also thought a nearly forty-year run was pretty good and there was no shame in hanging it up after all those years. I figured many combinations led me to this point. My hobby shop bartender predecessor Larry Horyna warned me of the perils of complete submersion into the hobby. Like just about anything else, it will get old doing it 24/7/365... and it did. Over the last several years, I stepped back from many hobby-related tasks to avoid not only complete burnout for me, but letting others down in case I was involved in a project that I was not able to complete or fulfill.

One of the few saving graces is, since I worked at the hobby shop, I would see all our customers bring in stuff for the display case, and also seeing what folks have at the ASM meetings every month. That was just enough to keep what little tiny flame was flickering inside me going.

Adrian Montano's $\frac{1}{32}$ AC and $\frac{1}{12}$ Formula 1 race car builds that he was able to complete in a few short weeks or even days. Bob Hendersons Wingnut wings WWI builds, John Tate's beautiful builds of non-mainstream subjects, Mike Blohm's $\frac{1}{12}$ -scale high flow output of the US air aces, to name a few. Trust me, the list goes on and on...

I finally got the motor running again after going to this year's Squadron's Eaglequest in Dallas, Texas. Lots of cool builds, easy going atmosphere and camaraderie, plus the GTFO week-long trip that accompanied it that I so desperately needed. Between the 2018 Nats and the 2019 EQ show, I had completed two models, as opposed to my usual one every month and a half or so. Since the June EQ show this year, there are two completed builds on the shelf and approximately nine projects in rotation on my bench. Not only is there my usual $\frac{1}{32}$ -scale AC, there are few $\frac{1}{12}$ Bandai Star Wars kits (which are excellent fun builds), two $\frac{1}{48}$ jets and a couple of $\frac{1}{44}$ airliners. The airliners were inspired by the proximity on the EQ contest hotel and the DFW International Airport. How cool is it to see a jetliner landing every five minutes, or a massive Qantas A380 flying over your head at a little over 600 - 800 feet!?

I guess what I am trying to say is that inspiration can strike anytime and anywhere just as easily as burnout can. Hopefully, I am back on track and will continue to build for years to come and enjoy the hobby with my friends and fellow modelers.












